

This EPD covers polyethylene (PE) sheets with a thickness from 10mm to 120mm for use in a wide range of applications, including tank containers, vats, prefabrication of parts, flotation devices for floating docks.

#### **Cut-off criteria:**

All major raw materials and all the essential energy is included. The production processes for raw materials and energy flows with very small amounts (less than 1%) are not included. These cut-off criteria do not apply for hazardous materials and substances.

#### **Allocation:**

The allocation is made in accordance with the provisions of EN 15804. Incoming energy and water and waste production in-house is allocated equally among all products through mass allocation. Effects of primary production of recycled materials is allocated to the main product in which the material was used. The recycling process and transportation of the material is allocated to this analysis.

## Data quality:

Specific data for the product composition are provided by the manufacturer. The data represent the production of the declared product and were collected for EPD development in the year of study. Background data is based on EPDs according to EN 15804 and different LCA databases. The data quality of the raw materials in A1 is presented in the table below.



## LCA: Scenarios and additional technical information

The following information describe the scenarios in the different modules of the EPD.

A4: The sheets are transported 1700km from Bad Hall, Austria to Langhus, Norway before delivery to customer which is set to 300km. The distance of 300km is given in newer PCRs as a default value for Norwegian domestic transport.

A5: Has not been included due to there being several ways of installation. Project specific EPDs available on request.

C1-C4: Has not been included as it is assumed that the sheets are left as is after end of life.
